The cause in general and the particular work of the Union owe so great a debt to his learning, his loving zeal and holy example that we should wish to make some such inadequate acknowledgment; and although there is to be a public memorial, yet we should desire to perpetuate this particular aspect of his life in a way which would bring before men's eyes the ideal and aim of intercommunion with the Eastern Church, and perhaps be, in the form of an Altar or Sacred Icon erected in a Church, a central shrine of the Society's life and work.

A sub-committee will be formed to consider a scheme and carry it out, and would be greatly assisted if they could receive at once donations or promises of support.

2.—When the General Secretary was in Russia last year, the President, Archbishop Agathangel, expressed his desire that a member, who should be competent in theology and history, might go to Russia and deliver some lectures on the Anglican Church, Ordinations, and Theology. This has again been pressed for from Russia, and we are certain that the effect of such a visit would be very important and valuable.
